

ast month's Blarney included a fine feature on "uisce beatha," or the "water of life," our good friend **whiskey**.

Here are a few additional tasty tidbits you might find interesting:

- You may notice that Scotch can sometimes have a very smoky taste. Why not Jameson's or Teeling? The reason is that the barley in Irish whiskey is dried in a closed kiln, whereas Scotch's barley is dried over a peat fire.
- Today, Irish whiskey accounts for just 5% of global whiskey sales. It constituted 60% of the world's whiskey until the Irish War of Independence began in 1919, when embargoes helped Scotch whisky take over.
- Like American bourbon, trict rules apply. Whiskey has to mature for three years in an oak barrel in Ireland to officially be called Irish whiskey.

ktoberfest 2016 in Ireland lasts for 18 days, Sept. 15-Oct. 2, and people will be walking down O'Connell Street in Dublin in dirndl and lederhosen. Party Central is at George's Dock and the atmospherics of this typically Bavarian event offers entertainment for the whole family. All can experience Munich's Oktoberfest culture with a cold Erdinger Oktoberfestbier, a German pretzel, black forest Kassler and a lot more all around German culture.

Many Irish travel to Munich by land, sea and air on itineraries that include guided tours, beer-tasting and pre- and post-festival stops in many European cities and locales. Maybe we need a FSOSP sign-up?
