The nervous sergeant said, "Sir, as you know, there are 250 men here on the post and no women. Sometimes the men have urges. That's why we have Molly the camel."


The captain said, "I can't say that I condone this, but I can understand about the 'urges', so the camel can stay."

Great Western Trail. Come to ride or just cheer on those who do.

Y'all got a raffle ticket booklet to sell? With only 500 tickets sold the odds someone you sell to will get some of the \$950 in prize money are way more than average, as we've often seen in past years.

At minimum, just one book is all you need to sell...just 10 tickets. You don't need to be reminded that if we get our annual fundraising done with these easy steps, we get to make the charity donations we are known for. (If not...well...it's "Mission Impossible.")

These events don't just happen without a lot of help from the membership. Ride day volunteers are needed and we'll have a short gathering at next Monday's meeting to get everyone organized.

o be sure, just as "everyone's Irish on St. Pat's," everyone is German during Octoberfest each year and you'll soon be blissfully enjoying this month's activities in Des Moines or its surrounding communities.

On Sept. 22-23 the historic Court District will offer a Craft Beer Village, Lederhosen Lane, Carnival Corner and the Silent Disco Party Plaza.

You can pay \$7 for a 1-day general admission or \$12 for a weekend pass.

Don't want to be in the downtown swirl? Try Ankeny's suburban celebration from 2-10 p.m. on Sept. 23 in cool new outdoor pavilions in the "old-town" area, just south off of First St. at the bike trail (think north of Firetrucker Brewery). Beer, music, food trucks, contest prizes... all for \$12.

Those are just examples of what you can find in towns all around the state during this festive time. In addition, nine major festivals will soon be on tap, stretching from Sept. 16 to Oct. 14. Here are a few of the best:

Dubuque Oktoberfest - Dubuque, IA - Sept. 16

"Rain or shine under the tri-states' largest festival tent. Event runs from 11 AM to 7 PM. Bier tasting from 3 to 6 pm with 25+ breweries. Live music, food, dancing, wiener dog races. Proceeds benefit Camp Albrecht Acres. General admission tickets are \$5 with bier tasting tickets \$25."

Fort Dodge Oktoberfest - Fort Dodge, IA - Sept. 23

"Featuring a large bier garten tent with custom wooden dance floor, food & a variety of draught beers on tap and live college football broadcasts all day."

Amana Oktoberfest - Amana, IA - Sept. 29 to Oct. 1

"Beer keg tapping (Friday at 2), parade (Saturday), live entertainment, games and activities. Other contests: log sawing, brat eating and the timber trek. Festhalle admission is \$10 for one day and \$15 for two days."

Northside Oktoberfest - Iowa City, IA - Sept. 30

"10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at 200 N Linn St., Iowa City. Includes brewfest with over 500 beers, Sodafest, 14 local food venders, live music, beaked chicked dance, adult contests. Admission is \$20 which gets you a .2L Kolsch glass & 8 drink tickets. Additional tickets \$.50 for samples costing from 1-4 drink tickets."

Adventureland Oktoberfest - Altoona, IA - Sept. 30

"General admission is \$25 online. VIP ticket is \$500 each (2 person minimum). Rain or shine event. 21+ only."

Burlington Lions Club Oktoberfest - Burlington, IA - Oct. 7

The club's signature event on the first Saturday in October. German food including bratwurst and sauerkraut. Bavarian musicians. Games including Stein Hoist. Authentic attire contest.

Manning Oktoberfest - Manning, IA - Oct. 14, 2017

"German food, polka music, dance lessons and Hausbarn tours. 5 PM keg tapping with Home Brew contest followed by German music and dancing from 7-10:30 p.m."
