oming in September, a **free lending library** for the members of the FSOSP.

Here are the details: When you come to the Sept. meeting, bring along any books that you would care to donate to the FSOSP library. Bring paper-back and hard cover books; no magazines or tabloids.

"We ask that the books be in good condition (not missing the last 10 pages!). And ideally, we are looking for a variety; fiction, biographies, self-help, history, etc.," says Bob Fogarty.

Members may check out books free of charge and without any accountability. No sign out, no records, just take a couple of books home, and return them at the next month's meeting. And bring along any books that you would like to donate.

"I understand that we have a donation of approx. 50 books to help us get started. We hope that many of you will have a book or two to donate to the collection," said Fogarty.

This begins in Sept., so do not bring books to the August meeting.
