

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
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# the prosp will play 'santa' this season in mentor iowa's adopt-a-ramily protram

As the holiday season quickly approaches, the staff at Mentor Iowa is excitedly planning their annual holiday party group event in December, a celebration that

Adopt-a-family sponsors work with the Mentor Iowa office to purchase needed items for the family. Mentor Iowa distributes a wish list to mentors, and then the mentor discusses with their mentee's family what they need and want for the holiday season. Items needed typically include: clothing, household items, shoes, books, games and whatever else is on the family's wish list. The average amount spent on each child is approximately \$75, but we can choose the amount we want to spend on the children.

Jim & Terrie O'Donnell have graciously offered to do the shopping for the family's gifts this year.

A "needs" list will be supplied by Nov. 27 and gifts are due to be delivered by Dec. 16.

Mentor Iowa is a non-profit, volunteer organization that was started in 1974 by citizens of the community, a Juvenile Court Judge, and court personnel, all of whom were concerned about the growing number of children served by the court. The mission of the organization is to provide trained volunteer mentors to abused, neglected, and delinquent children who are under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court.

"We do this by working in partnership with the children, their families, and the community. Community volunteers present a solution by providing the mentor services to the ever-increasing number of Children in Need of Assistance (CINA) and delinquent youth in central Iowa," said Lester.



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The board voted to approve a \$220 donation to the CMA organization this month. They requested that we keep the donation modest because of our meager resources and we appreciate that.

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
Ever been to a Minnesota or Wisconsin "meat raffle"? President T-Bone (ironic name to connect to this, eh?) has suggested we try it out.
