Since my parents just got back from a trip to Ireland and Blarney Castle I figured I would include some fun info about it.

The Blarney Stone (Irish: Cloch na Blarnan) is a block of Carboniferous limestone built into the battlements of Blarney Castle, Blarney, about 8 kilometres (5 miles) from the centre of Cork City, Ireland. According to legend, kissing the stone endows the kisser with the gift of the gab (great eloquence or skill at flattery). The stone was set into a tower of the castle in 1446. The castle is a popular tourist site in Ireland, attracting visitors from all over the world to kiss the stone and tour the castle and its gardens.

The word blarney has come to mean 'clever, flattering, or coaxing' Irish politician John O'Connor Power defined it this way: "Blarney is something more than mere flattery. It is flattery sweetened by humor and flavored by wit. Those who mix with Irish folk have many examples of it in their everyday experience."

It is claimed that the synonymy of 'blarney' with 'empty flattery' or 'beguiling talk' derives from one of two sources. One story involves the goddess Clíodhna and Cormac Laidir MacCarthy. Another legend suggests that Queen Elizabeth I requested Cormac MacDermot MacCarthy, the Lord of Blarney, be deprived of his traditional land rights. Cormac travelled to see the queen, but was certain he would not persuade her to change her mind, as he wasn't an effective speaker. He met an old woman on the way who told him that anyone who kissed a particular stone in Blarney Castle would be given the gift of eloquent speech.

Cormac went on to persuade the queen that he should not be deprived of his land.

Irish History

- 1737 Launch of the Belfast News Letter, now the oldest surviving newspaper in Ireland or Britain, and one of the oldest in the world.
- 1729 Death of dramatist, essayist and publisher Sir Richard Steele, the Dubliner who founded The Tatler and The Spectator.
- 1731 Birth of Sir Lucius O'Brien, opposition politician, once described as 'a man who disagrees with the rest of mankind by thinking well of himself.'
- 1771 Benjamin Franklin's visit to Ireland begins.
- 1798 Cornwallis moves forward from Tuam to attack Castlebar Humbert leaves Castlebar with 800 French troops and 1000 Irish rebels and moves into Co Sligo. His plan is to march to Ulster. Humbert marches all night. Rising takes place in Longford and Westmeath.
- 1814 Birth of James O'Flanagan, author, in Fermoy, Co. Cork.
- 1830 Dublin Zoo opens.
- 1830 The "Wild Colonial Boy" is shot dead in a gun battle with police at Cambelltown, Sydney. Contrary to the popular song, "The Wild Colonial Boy" was John Donohue, transported from Ireland in 1824.
- 1905 Birth of James "Snowy" Dunne, widely regarded as one of Ireland's greatest centre forwards. He played for Arsenal, Southampton and the Shamrock Rovers.
- 1913 A meeting of 400 employers with William Martin Murphy pledges not to employ any persons who continue to be members of the Irish Transport & General Workers' Union.
- 1930 The first edition of the Irish Press, a Dublin daily newspaper founded by De Valera as a platform for Fianna Fáil, is published.
- 1942 IRA Volunteer Tom Williams is hanged at Belfast's Crumlin Road Jail.
- 1972 Tony Fleming is born in Virginia USA.
- 1972 Mary Peters wins the women's pentathlon in Munich and becomes the first Irish woman to win an Olympic Gold medal.
- 1987 Cyclist Stephen Roche wins the World Professional Road Race Championship.
- 1999 Van Morrison becomes the first inductee to The Hot Press Irish Music Hall of Fame.
- 2002 Hugh Orde, Northern Ireland's new chief constable vows to crack down on paramilitary "godfathers" who have orchestrated a series of unsolved sectarian murders.
- 2002 Ireland forms an alliance with Germany, Austria, Belgium, Denmark and Greece in a bid to limit the expansion of nuclear energy.
